Summer Reading End of Novel ONE-PAGER FOR RISING 7TH AND 8TH GRADERS

A "ONE-PAGER" is assigned to promote thoughtful appreciation and understanding of a novel. ONE-PAGERS are a great way for you to incorporate your ideas with artistic elements. You will create a final product that resembles a magazine cover-large clear images-block lettering, a balanced layout etc. One-pagers, when done well, also provide a terrific review that can inspire others to read your book.

You must use one sheet of white, unlined computer paper for your **ONE**-**PAGER**. The idea is for you include as much meaningful information as possible in an organized, concise format.

Your **ONE-PAGER** should include the following:

ON THE FRONT . . .

- 1. Title of novel and author's name
- 2. A list of characters from the novel
- 3. A description of when and where the novel took place
- 4. Five adjectives you would use to describe the novel
- 5. One important quotation (A sentence or two from the novel)
 - -Write the quotation in quotation marks
 - -Include the page number
 - -Next to the quotation, explain why it is significant (i.e. "This quotation expresses...")
- 6. At least **3 drawings, symbols, and/or images** that represent aspects of the story ~Use color, be creative, be neat, and fill the page
- 7. One higher level question that can be answered after you read the novel

ON THE BACK . . .

- 1. A **one paragraph summary** of the novel <u>(in your own words)</u> that includes details about the plot, setting, characters, main ideas and conflicts, and the ending. DO NOT PARAPHRASE OR COPY INFORMATION FROMTHE INTERNET. THIS IS PLAGIARISM AND WILL RESULT INA ZERO IN THE ASSIGNMENT AND A DISCIPLANARY REFERRAL
- 2. Your name and class core
